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1. PREFACE

The Seva Sadan's R. K. Talreja College of Arts, Science & Commerce, Ulhasnagar-421003, accredited with Grade "B+" by the National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore is situated in the heart of city Ulhasnagar (city of joy), a place 60 km east of Mumbai in Thane District, Maharashtra. The college was started in the year 1961 by the trust "SEVA SADAN". The trust was established by Seth Parasram Parumal, a visionary philanthropist in year 1948 for serving the community especially the "SINDHIS" who migrated here from "SINDH" province after partition of the India. Initially the college was started as girls' college with 57 students of Ulhasnagar with the aim to alleviate the sufferings faced by the girls who otherwise travelled such long distances to Mumbai for higher education. However after the first year of establishment, the founder felt the need to cater to all sections of community and the college became co-educational. Today it stands as R. K. Talreja College of Arts, Science & Commerce in honour of contribution made by Late Ramchand Kimatram Talreja.

Since its inception the college is constantly imparting quality education to the people of India in general. In an educationally backward city of Thane district, the college has proudly completed fifty years of existence with its two campuses and student's strength of 5,300 and faculty strength of 100. In its path of progress, the college upholds its vision "CHATRA: SANSKAREN SUJANA BHAVANTU" and mission "OUR MISSION IS TO EDUCATE, ENLIGHTEN AND EMPOWER STUDENTS IN GENERAL AND GIRLS IN PARTICULAR THERE BY DEVELOPING THEIR MENTAL, PHYSICAL AND EMOTIONAL DIMENSIONS IN ORDER TO CREATE BETTER CITIZENS AND SOCIETY. TO THIS END WE ENDEAVOR TO MOBILIZE THE AVAILABLE RESOURCES WHICH ARE NECESSARY FOR HIGHER EDUCATION AND ADD TO EXISTING ONE" for which it was established.

The college is permanently affiliated to the University of Mumbai, Mumbai under linguistic minority status. It is also included under section 2f and 12(B) of UGC Act 1956. First campus is spread on 2 acre of land situated near Kalyan-Badlapur Highway. The college offers 14 undergraduate (UG) courses, 9 postgraduate courses (PG) and 2 PhD programmes (all aided) in 32 spacious, well furnished class rooms and 12 well equipped laboratories. It has two play grounds, one well equipped Conference Hall, one up-to-date Auditorium with Audio-Visual System, one Gymkhana, one separate Administrative Building and one separate Library Building. Our library is reputed in the district of Thane for having a good infrastructure and voluminous collection of the books. At second campus which is spread on 1.5

acre of land situated near Central Hospital, the college offers 6 self financing courses at UG level viz. BMM, BMS, B. Com. (Account & Finance), B. Com (Banking & Insurance), B.Com (Finance & Market) and B. Sc. IT to cater to demands of the society. The idea of extending our college campus and to start new courses fructified after suggestions made by the NAAC peer team at their visit to the college in the year 2004 for purpose of accreditation.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been set up for the quality enhancement and sustenance of the college. Since the inception IQAC has taken several steps towards quality upgradation, continuous assessment and re-accreditation of the college. The IQAC has recommended several committees to be formed for conducting activities/programmes throughout the academic year to sharpen the students and other stakeholders. The NAAC steering committee was set up with senior Vice-Principal Prof. C. J. Thadani as the convenor of the committee to prepare and submit the Self Study Report (SSR) of the college for re-accreditation process for Cycle II. 2. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

R. K. Talreja College of Arts, Science & Commerce was started by the trust Seva Sadan in 1961 with the mission to educate, enlighten and empower students in general and girls in particular by developing their mental, physical and emotional dimensions in order to create better citizens and society. To this end we endeavour to mobilize and increase available resources which are necessary for higher education.

The curriculum is solely developed and implemented by the University of Mumbai, Mumbai which we adhere to. The college, however, took several efforts on its own to implement the curriculum very effectively. A common time table is framed in the beginning of the academic session and the departments are instructed to follow the same very strictly. The faculty members are entrusted the responsibility of interpreting each portion of curriculum including examination pattern, mandatory attendance, allotting assignment work, unit test and active participation in various activities conducted by the departments. To ensure better understanding, planning and implementation of the curriculum, many departments with the help of Board of Studies of the university organize several curriculum based meetings and workshops in college premises. The faculty members are also encouraged to attend curriculum based- seminars/ symposia/workshops and other programmes organised by the university. The college encourages faculty members to be part of syllabus framing committees and Boards of Studies of the university. The departments are encouraged to prescribe reference books for acquisition made by the library. The departments ensure timely completion of syllabus so that other tasks such question papers setting, conduct of exams, evaluation of answer books, declaration of result could be finished as per schedule. The college encourages feedback from students periodically.

The college offers 20 under graduate, 9 post graduate courses and 2 doctoral programme. All UG and PG courses are as per the Credit Based Grading and Semester System of University of Mumbai. The system provides better flexibility to the students at any level FY, SY, TY. The credits earned by them facilitate inter college and inter university mobility.

The curriculum is enriched by encouraging students for quiz competition, field trips /industrial visits and science exhibition projects. These visits and excursions provide hand-on experience to students and increasing employment prospects. The students are also asked to put forth their suggestions on curriculum and the same are forwarded to respective Boards of Studies for discussion and incorporation. Some departments ensure participation of selected UG and PG students during meeting of syllabus framing committees and Board of Studies of University. The Science association of the college encourages students to put there scientific ideas in pictorial form like RANGOLI to simplify the concept of science.

Since academic year 2013-14, the college strictly follows the enrolment system of University of Mumbai. At entry level (First Year of UG courses), the students register themselves on university's portal to fill the application form online. The university takes the responsibility of sending students for various courses in different affiliated colleges on merit basis. The college with the help of admission committee ensures smooth admission for students. The teaching, non teaching and senior students act as counselors to the students seeking admission. For on the spot admission to the students, the banking services are available in the college premises. This ensures easy availability of demand draft of requisite fee. Time to time, the cut off percentage/merit list and number of students enrolled and the number of seats vacant is regularly displayed on notice boards. Reservation policy of Central and State Govt. for SC, ST, OBC and other minority students is followed strictly during admission process.

Our primary task is to reach out to students and cater to their holistic development. The students are always helped by providing necessary guidance and facilities at both department and college level. Extra efforts are taken to improve the quality of students who are weak in subject and communication skills. Students Guidance and Counseling Cell of the college takes extra interest in students coming from low income family or facing domestic problem. Financial aid and support is provided to economically poor

students from the Student Aid Fund where necessary permission is given to students to pay their fees in installments.

Our college's academic calendar is made on a yearly basis from which a teaching schedule of 180 days is chalked out. Every department plans its activities in accordance with the academic calendar. All Heads of the Departments monitor syllabus completion through periodical departmental meetings. Initial lectures of every academic year aims at orienting the students with syllabus and Credit Based Grading System (CBGS). Examination Committee (EC) of the college displays the examination schedule on the college and students notice-boards and college's websites and ensures the internal assessment and semester-end examinations. The committee also endeavours to see that the evaluation of answer books are completed by the teachers concerned within time and declares the results. The IQAC has suggested several strategies such as to increase number of laptops, projectors, screens, provide net connectivity to class rooms, laboratories so that the teaching learning processes can be improved. Separate computer with Internet Facility has been provided to the students for easy learning. The students are given full freedom during and after routine lectures and practicals (if any) to interact with teacher to remove doubts/problems. The teachers frequently use modern technologies such as audio-visual system, power point presentations, model, charts etc for better understanding of students. The teachers also provide written materials, printed notes for easy understanding of the contents. Some departments maintain their own library to make books easily available to the students during routine lectures and practicals (if any).

The college promotes the students to participate in workshops/seminars/conference etc enhance their exposure and get expertise. A platform for creative outlet is given to students to pen down their thoughts in the form of poems, essays, stories etc in the college magazine. Cultural Committee, through its Annual Cultural Programmes, "EXPRESSIONS", draws out the latent talents of the students by giving them an opportunity to show-case their creativity. The Arts Circle, a branch of the Cultural Committee, organizes mehandi, nail art, calligraphy, painting, poster-making, rangoli, salad dressing, flower arrangement, best out of waste competitions to develop creative talent. Seven-day residential camp is organized every year and a number of activities are planned and organized to develop social awareness and inculcate responsibility and accountability among students. Special Days like Human Rights Day, AIDs Day, Women's Day, Constitution Day etc are also celebrated. The students are given regular guidance about the competitive examinations of centre such as UPSC, MPSC, Banks, NET, SET, GATE, ICMR JRF etc.

The selection and recruitment of the teaching staff is done as per the UGC norms and the guidelines of the University of Mumbai. The teacher's competency in term of the command on the subjects and communication skills is judged by the experts nominated by the university during the interview. Faculty members are deputed to attend orientation programmes and refresher courses organized by Academic Staff colleges in the country to keep them updated in their subjects. The teachers are also encouraged to attend training programmes, summer programmes etc to enhance their skills.

The College strictly follows the University's guidelines regarding the examination and evaluation systems. No separate evaluation reforms are initiated by the college. Since the year 2011-12 the credit based grading system for F. Y. students, 2012-13 for the S. Y. and PG part I, and 2013-14 for the T. Y. and PG part II has been adopted by the college, as implemented by University of Mumbai. Examinations are conducted at the end of each semester. Each semester comprises 60% for semester end examination and 40% for internal assessment as per the BOS guidelines. The details of formative evaluation have been discussed in SSR under pointer "2.5.4" of subsection "Evaluation Process and Reforms" of Section (Criterion II) at page No.The evaluation of learners' performance is done as per the university guidelines. The results are discussed with the students and tips to do better during next semesters are given to students. The weaker students are given special emphasis to improve their learning and the overall performance.

The college has taken the initiatives for research activities and for the same the faculty members have been told for applying for to be the research guide from the University of Mumbai. Some of the faculty members who are already research guide from the university have been provided space to set up of research laboratory with facilities for the research. The faulty members have been motivated for submitting more and more research proposals to funding agencies in the country for funds and to enhance research facility in the college. In this context, a Research Development Committee (RDC) with Principal Dr. L. Natrajan as its chairperson has been set up in the college to

monitor the ongoing research activities, to help the teachers who were/are submitting proposals and also to assess the proposals prior to submission to funding agencies. The faculty members were encouraged to publish research data in reputed and refereed journals of the field. The college also encouraged the students to do the research and to develop research culture among them. Some of the students have done/are doing research in the college with the help some organizations such TIFR and BARC. The college has updated with subscription of journals, Magazines, SODHGANGA, with INFLIB Net and WEB OPC facility.

The college does not have any funds for the research. The faculty members are encouraged to manage own funds by submitting research proposals and do work in collaboration with academia and industries. Many faculty members have published research work in several reputed journals with impact factor. The faculty members of have developed an interdisciplinary research activities and have presented and published during various events. The research expertise(s) are shared with students of neighbouring colleges.

The college on its level has provided many infrastructure facilities for doing the research. The computer laboratories are easily accessible to staff and students from 7.0am to 6.0pm. Internet facility is provided to staff and students in the library and also in various departments. The equipments in the departments especially in science departments are available for all staff members and students for their practical and research work with prior permission from the respective head of the department. The chemicals which are not easily available and are costly are shared by all the science departments as and when required. The college library is well equipped with books, journals, e-journals, magazines. The staff and students are given easy access to it.

Many faculty members have published research papers/articles in reputed journals of the field. The details of publication have given in the SSR and listed in Annexure. The college did not provide any paid consultancy services. The faculty members and students of the college however extend their services and expertise free of cost to help the people. Several activities are organized at college level involving the students of various disciplines to serve the society and other stakeholders. The faculty members are trying to collaborate with academia and industries in the country and abroad in order to improve the research quality of the college.

The college in present has two campuses with area of 2 acre each. In old campus the college has separate buildings for academic and administrative activities. Sufficient class rooms (40 class rooms) and laboratories are available for routine lectures and practicals (if any). The class rooms and Laboratories are well furnished and well equipped including some class rooms and laboratories with internet and computer facility. Each unit/department is supplied with UPS/Inverter backup. Separate rooms with internet facility have been given to NSS, NCC, Gymkhana, WDC, IQAC, etc for smooth conduction of programme throughout the academic year. An auditorium and a holding Conference Hall have been built for purpose of seminars/symposia/conference etc and executive meetings respectively. One two- storied library building with big reading room for staff and students with newspaper section, study room for competitive exam section etc. The College campus has one botanical garden with many plants.

Library has ground plus three storied separate building each floor 416.25Sq.M*3 Floor= 1248.75Sq.M. The sitting capacity is 175. The Layout of the library is:

3rd floor: Passive collection.

2nd floor: Periodical section, News paper section competitive exam books section, Reference books section, Reading Room, Binding Room.

1st floor: Book stacking area, Reading space circulation section IT zone for accessing e-resources. A special study Room with computer and internet facility for staff and Ph. D. Students. The library is well updated with modern facilities as detailed in section "Library as learning Resources" of SSR.

The college is well equipped with IT facility. Under UGC scheme, the college has provided computer and Internet facility to each department/units. A separate provision of using computer and internet for students has been set up in the college library. The college has sufficient number of laptops, LCD projector and screens. The computer department of the college has two computer labs containing more than 50 computers.

The College provides excellent student support services in various forms to facilitate the transformation among the students as visualized in the mission of the college. The Convenor of "Students Counseling Cell" takes the responsibility of all student support activities. The Student Council members act as a link between the students and the management through the committee . The economically weak students are given scholarships, freeships etc. The college is always helpful in terms of infrastructure, curriculum and support services.

The college provides necessary guidance regarding various competitive examinations including civil services and NET/SET to its students. The PG students are always encouraged get higher degrees like PhD and M. Phil in their subjects. The several committees set up in the college conduct various programmes/activities such Science Exhibition, Debate and Elocution, Arts Circle, Rangoli Competition, cultural programmes etc for the students. The students participating in such activities are given special care before and during the programme. The women development cell (WDC) of the college organized MARSHAL ARTS training for girl students. The NSS and NCC students perform several activities throughout the academic year. The Gymkhana offers several Outdoor and Indoor activities for the students throughout the academic year.

The main goal of the college is to provide holistic education. Thus in addition to the regular academic program, the college gives prominence to the development of personality, aesthetic and moral perspectives. This provides an opportunity to prepare the young generation to assimilate our complex, socio-cultural environment and face the challenges ahead of them.

We have adopted certain strategies to fulfill our objectives.

Many of the students have been found to be first learners. They are encouraged and given guidance to choose their career. Moreover, a large number of our girl students are from the deprived sector. They are motivated to complete graduation.

The management plays a major role in the growth and development of the college. They facilitates the maintenance and up-gradation of infrastructure, addresses and settles the grievances of teaching and nonteaching faculty amicably and reviews various activities planned and implemented by the Principal. The management makes polices in line with the mission of the college & designs action plans accordingly. The policy statements and action plans are formulated in consultant & discussion with the Governing Council, Principal, VPs, LMC & HODS. The LMC meets at least twice in an academic year to take a stock of the implementation of developmental plans. Interaction with stakeholders takes place through parent student teacher meetings & directly with students through student feedback reports.

The LMC holds timely meetings for discussing matters such as preparation of the budget, formulaion of proposals for new expenditures etc. The Institute's perspective plans to:

- ➤ implement web-based management system for academic and administrative procedure
- various aspects considered in perspective plan development include academic growth, growth and motivation for research, infrastructural and administrative betterment, providing need-based facilities to all the stakeholders.

The important decisions regarding the institute are taken in the Governing Council. Teacher and students policy decisions are taken in the LMC. Recruiting New staff, introducing new courses and other such important issues is discussed in the LMC and the Governing Council. The Principal, in coordination with the Vice-Principals takes decisions in administrative matters. HOD's are also involved in academic decision making process. Teaching and learning has become more equipped and technically sound with more computer use during lectures with power point presentations, showing films, and other literature and study material. Research and development has seen a significant rise since after the first Accreditation. Many teachers have completed M. Phil, Ph. D and some minor research projects of UGC as well as of the University.

Budget is prepared department wise and submitted to local managing Committee and recommendation to management. After receiving the approval of the budget, expenses are incurred as per the budgetary provisions. Daily cash book checking by the Principal. Approval by the Principal of any payment with her signature on the voucher. The cheques signed by two signatories of which the Principal's signature is mandatory. Internal audit of accounts on six monthly basis. Few teachers are recognized Ph. D Guides of the University. Teachers are also appointed on panel of referees in various Universities to adjudicate M. Phil. and Ph. D. theses.

The major sources of Institutional resources are fee received from students, grant in aid from State Govt. and charges for conducting examination of external agencies such as railway, banks, ICAI, ONGC, and Institute of distance and open learning (IDOL).

The IQAC in its meeting has made several strategies for effective and efficient functioning of both academic and administrative units. Following suggestions made by the IQAC, several initiatives have been taken at college level for smooth functioning of the various systems.

The college has adopted many innovative practices in academic and administrative matters. It is open for adapting to up-and-coming trends in Higher Education and is willing to be open to this cause. The college responds to eco concerns with its eco friendly initiatives. The plantation has been done at both campuses of the college. Energy conservation with, CFL and LED bulbs, carbon neutrality (in cultivating micro algae to confiscate excessive carbon released) has been initiated in college campus.

Since thirty years, the college organizes intercollegiate debate and elocution competition in four languages (Sindhi, Marathi, Hindi, English). This was initiated by the founder late Seth Parasram Parumal.

3. SWOC ANALYSIS

Seva Sadan the two words carried by the late Baba Seth Parasram Paramal is high in intrinsic value. "Seva" denotes service and "Sadan" denotes "Centre". In simple words, "Seva Sadan" stands for a "Centre for providing Service". The vision envisaged by Baba more than 50 years ago, witnessing the plight of some young girls commuting to college in Bombay (today Mumbai), became the core of his philanthropy for the generation of Ulhasnagar to take advantage.

Initially, what started of as a necessity for the migrant population of Sindhi staying in Ulhasnagar, today boasts of a centre from KG to PG along with professional courses D.Ed. and B.Ed. At present these institutions work in three shifts to disburse knowledge not only to the migrants but also to the needy in general.

Visionaries associated with Baba in this crusade for selfless service swore by him in matter of commitment. Contemporaries like us today at Seva Sadan are "Setting Everlasting Vision Always to serve Academic Development of Aspiring Nation".

Seva Sadan' R.K. Talreja College of Arts, Science and Commerce is an old established College with a reputation to attract students. We offer many courses including post graduate courses at affordable fees as prescribed by the norms of University of Mumbai.

The Seva Sadan Trust is keen in serving the society with an educational bent of mind. In the commercialized world of today where money speaks, our Institution takes pride in not encouraging capitation fees. Inspite of linguistic minority status the college caters to a wide variety of students including students from reserved category. The central location of the college, its proximity and access by road and to three railways stations attract students especially girls even from rural areas. Most of the operations of the college like library, administrative activities, admissions, examinations, scholarships and issuing of certificates etc are successfully computerized. Most of the computers are under LAN and equipped with internet facility. In recent years the college has taken efforts to improve classrooms teaching by acquiring more laptops. The laboratories are spacious and a number of equipments have been added and the student teacher ratio of the science faculty is fair and favourable.

The college Library is the biggest in the district of Thane with its three storied building. It has a collection of more than one lakh books and a separate section for books for competitive exams. And study room facility for Ph.D

students and staff members it also provided external Library Membership facilities to students and institutions. To ensure transparency refunds to the students of caution money are by way of direct transfer to students account. Teachers are research oriented paving the way for research culture among students. The overwhelming number of female members among the staff and students reflects the contribution of Baba in Women empowerment.

The growth of the college has been limited due to space constraints and as a result the college is unable to introduce Add On Courses. Most of the Department's classrooms and Library are covered by inverter back up facility yet certain sections do suffer due to long power cuts. Considering the large number of students we cater to there is insufficient parking space in the premises. All the teaching and non-teaching vacancies are not filled due to the requirements of No Objection Certificates from the Government. Temporary staff are appointed to take care of the workload. Inspite of the college having a website and networking facility traditional modes of communication have to be used to interact with students of mofusil areas.

As there are many students admitted from poor and backward strata of Society, College can help them to advance in life. The college can plan to use technology in the best possible manner and also train students who are lagging behind. Further, after the college receives the approval for expanding the infrastructure steps can be taken to introduce Add on courses for the development of existing students and also introduce more programmes at UG and PG level. With globalization in the field of education, the college can develop linkages with industry, Institutions and Universities of repute. As a member of the INFLIBNET, the college can provide access to thousands of books, articles and journals to attract research students.

With the proliferation of professional courses in Science and Arts streams the college is finding it difficult to attract good students. Though the college has developed internal computer programs for various activities a lot of information is provided to various Government agencies and University and the lack of synchronization between the various agencies pose a problem. Many of our students are from lower strata of society and engage in part time jobs and as a result we are unable to encourage them to use the facilities like Library & Gymkhana etc. They do not find time for extracurricular activities either. Range of Core / Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the College.

- ➤ The college offers 66 combinations at the entry level of arts, in which 22 combination of three optional subjects are available hence students has flexibility to understand and choose the major subjects in the final year.
- There is flexibility to change the subject combinations for students at 1st year and 2nd year if they find their chosen combination difficult.
- For science streams college offers 6 combinations at entry point. For 2nd year students can opt 2 optional subjects and for 3rd year they can select one major subject. According to their understanding of the subjects and their capability, students get sufficient time and flexibility.
- For the commerce stream, students have flexibility to choose 2 optional subjects in 2nd year and 4 optional subjects at 3rd year.
- College offers B. Com course which leads two specialization in Accountancy and Financial management which is helpful for the students who want to pursue for CA. They are exposed to tally counting package which is useful for jobs and for own practice. While computer as optional subject to B. Com. students increases the job opportunities in IT sector. Communication skills / business communication at the entry level improve the communication skills of the students.

- ➤ In order to bring all round awareness among the students, multidisciplinary course is made compulsory for 1st year and 2nd year students.
- Research methodology subject has been made compulsory for TY BA Economics and History students and for 2nd year M. Com. Students which help them understand research projects in future.
- > There is the provision of opting language for MA students and subject for M. Com. Students after clearing the eligibility test, even though students had not majored at graduate level.

 - M. Sc. (by Papers) in Botany, Microbiology and Zoology
 - Ph.D in Hindi and Botany.
- Enrichment Courses/programs:-
 - ➤ Women Development Cell organizes various programmes to address different social, personal, legal issues faced by women in general and girls in particular. They are also encouraged to take up vocation based skills and made aware of the opportunities available.

- > Career and Counseling Cell guide the students in developing their Personality and Confidence through various training programmes.
- > Saral Hindi Pathyakram, under Hindustani Prachar Sabha, Mumbai conduct short term courses in Hindi with an aim to promote Hindi Language.
- > NCC and NSS Units of College carry out various activities like tree plantation, blood donation, traffic sense, save electricity campaign and street play to educate the community to save natural resources of earth.
- > NCC Unit (Girls and Boys) train the students in disciplined manner as well prepare them for the career in Defense services.
- > Student Council members take initiative in conducting various programmes beneficial for students' growth and development. This in turn enable them to develop their own leadership qualities as well make them adept in effective planning and managing day to day affairs.
- 1.2.4 Does institution offer self financed programmes, if 'yes' list them and indicate how they differ from other programs With reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc

The college provides following self financed undergraduate courses.

Curriculum is designed by the Board of Studies for each respective subject. The fee structure is prescribed by the University of Mumbai. Qualification for teaching and non-teaching staff is as per the University guidelines. A consolidated salary in the range of 12,000-25,000 is paid with regular increments every year according to qualification. Few Teachers, expert in the subject are invited as guest lecturer to deliver the lecture and motivate the students.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programmes and the beneficiaries.

Yes. The college does provide the skill oriented programmes.

The Saral Hindi Programme is organized by the Hindi Department to make the students more proficient in Hindi Language.

Botany Department organizes workshops for Bonsai, Terrarium etc. It also trains the science students (Zoology and Botany) for making jam, jellies, sauces and pickles as an effort in developing entrepreneurial skills.

Commerce students get training in Tally and computers in Earn while you learn scheme Enrichment courses.

The institution participates and encourages students for field trips /industrial visits and science exhibition projects and quizzing. Many associations are formed either purely related to the individual departments or taking more than two departments as interdisciplinary approach to channelize the potential of the students.

Science association encourages students to put there scientific ideas in an artistic form as Rangoli to simplify the concept of science.

1.3.2 What are efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Curriculum is further enhanced by organizing case studies, guest lectures, tours, field visits, industrial visits etc. These visits and excursions provide hand on experience to students and increase the employment prospects

Debates and Elocution competition are also held, to improve the oratory skill and personality of the students.

College conducts on behalf of University national and state level workshops/ seminars to give exposure to the students in the upcoming fields

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental education Human Rights, ICT etc into the curriculum?

The Women Development Cell has been constituted as per norms of University of Mumbai. It conducts various workshops and programs on gender related topics. Some of these are organized by NGOs. Our premises are gender friendly as directed by Maharashtra state Govt.

For the purpose of climate change and environmental education, all departments are involved in propagating the concept of reduce, recycle and reuse. Rain Water harvesting is practiced by the College to ensure Sustainable use of water natural resource.

NCC and NSS extension activity unit of our college carry out activities like tree plantation, blood donation, traffic sense, save electricity and street play to educate the community to save natural resources of earth.

The teachers are trained in e-content, digital libraries, power point presentations. The library is the biggest asset and is completely automated. It provides free access to computer and internet facility to the staff and the students. The library is well stocked with the latest and the much needed books, journals, magazines, reference books.

Though no courses are conducted, programmes are organized by NSS, NCC units, Counseling Cell and other committees.

NCC Unit organizes cultural programmes on Independence and Republic Day so as to develop and strengthen the patriotic feelings.

The NSS Unit has initiated Anti - Dowry, Anti - Drug, Anti - Tobacco oaths by the staff and the students.

Science association undertook an initiative to bring awareness among the students regarding the organ donation and students were registered online for donating organ.

Career Placement programmes are organized by the Placement Cell of the college. National and International Companies are invited for Campus placements of students.

Tree Plantation, Traffic Control, Aids Awareness drives are conducted by the college for community development.

All these programmes were introduced based on students demand and with the aim of making optimum use of the available infrastructure.

The college ensures publicity and transparency in the admission process as follows:

- > Norms laid down by the University of Mumbai and state government are strictly followed.
- > Publicity is given through Print media for new courses as and when introduced.
- > The University circulars regarding online registration and admission are displayed on college notice boards and also at prominent locations near the college main gates.
- ➤ Since 2013-2014 (as online admission process was adopted by the University of Mumbai), the college provides all admission related information to the admission vigilance committee of University of Mumbai. For On-line registration, help was provided to students at concessional rates.
- > The college staff members (both teaching and non-teaching) regularly guide the visiting students about seats availability, extension of online registration and admission dates (if any) by the University.
- > Cut off percentage/merit list is displayed and followed sincerely.
- > "No donation for admission" policy is strictly followed by the management.
- ➤ The Public Information Officer and the Appellate Authority attend to 'Right To Information' applications regarding admission matters on priority basis.

- > Admission is based on merit with strict adherence to norms prescribed by the University of Mumbai and Government of Maharashtra.
- ➤ An Admission committee as per the statutes of affiliating University is constituted with the Vice Principal as convenor and senior teachers as members. The committee takes care to include students from socially disadvantaged background.
- > In accordance with the University and the rules of Government of Maharashtra, in-house students are given preference and admitted first and the vacant seats are filled on merit basis.
- > Provision of admission for students who have gained recognition in sports or extracurricular activities as per university norms.
- > Counseling is also done as and when needed to help the students with regard to choice of subjects or selection.
- ➤ Admission to post graduate courses is done according to the rules prescribed by the University. M. Com. and M.A. students are admitted by the college directly on the basis of merit. However M. Sc. Admission is centralized at the university level for all colleges and the list of students selected for the college is sent by the university.
- ➤ PhD students are given admission after clearing PET test conducted by University of Mumbai and later interviewed by a panel of subject experts.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profile annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

It was found that the college was getting less and less students for science and arts in comparison to commerce. Efforts were made by the teachers in the admission committee to counsel the students about the scope of pure science and arts which has improved the admission in these courses.

Similarly, the students were not aware of the opportunities for courses like B. Com. (B/I) and B. Com. (FM). The teachers from the concerned faculty were asked to counsel the students and this in turn has improved the admission to such courses.

Similarly efforts were made to convince the religious minority students to choose their courses after being counseled about the various Central Govt. scholarships.

- > Yes, an admission committee is formed to facilitate the admission process.
- ➤ The committee discusses the schedule and the policy of admission process in accordance with the suggestions of the Principal and the Management.
- > The students are given the admission on the basis of merit and as per the instructions given by the University of Mumbai.

- > The difficulties experienced by the admission committee during this process are discussed and remedial measures are suggested to the Principal for future implementation.
- > The admission committee also guides the students in the choice of the programme.
- ➤ All these efforts have led to the smooth conduct of admission process as every minute details of the admission are well presented in the prospectus as the reckoner for the students.

SC/ST

Reservation policy of Government of Maharashtra is strictly followed while preparing merit list for granting admissions. Scholarships and free ships granted by the Government of Maharashtra are brought to the notice of the students.

Reservation policy of Government of Maharashtra is strictly followed while preparing merit list for granting admissions. The percentage of reservation for OBC students is strictly followed and scholarships and free ships are also brought to the notice of students.

WOMEN

More than 50% of the candidates admitted are girl student. Hence their participation in all academic and extracurricular activities is equal and even more than that of boy students.

DIFFFRENTLY ABLED

Handicapped students are admitted as per reservation policy and given assistance during examination. The college admits almost all handicapped students who approached the college for admission and they are given concession in fees also.

EBC scholarships are given to the eligible students as per the rule. In addition candidates who are not eligible for EBC free ship and are unable to pay full fees are provided fee concessions and also

financial assistance from student aid fund. Principal and faculty members also help the students at a personal level.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
 - > Students with physical disability are given extra time during the examinations, and writer facility for blind ,/deformed hands.
 - > If possible lecture is arranged on the ground floor.
 - > Special assistance are extended by the teaching and nonteaching staff whenever required.
 - ➤ For slow learners and learning disabled students, special care and counseling is provided to help them overcome their problems.
- 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The only yardstick for the assessment of students before admitting them to a programme is the marks scored by them in the previous exams and the college takes care to see that it follows the given eligibility criteria put forward by the University of Mumbai. 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Orientation is given to the students with regard to the programme they have chosen. The evaluation of students is done by the teachers and the teacher takes care to assign certain challenges through the various enrichment programmes developed. Study material is being provided for easy comprehensibility. Weak students are given special attention.

2.2.4How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The College sensitizes students on socially relevant issues. Men Against Violence and Abuse (NGO) held gender sensitization programme titled, "Naatu Tuze Aani Maaze". NSS and WDC have conducted workshops on Self- defence. Elocution competitions on gender sensitivity and environmental issues are conducted. Poster making competition and graffiti making on environmental issues were also part of the programmes. Apart from these subjects like FC and EVS stimulate students and teachers towards social and gender relevant issues.

2.2.5How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified from class interactions and exam results. They are then given intensive coaching and guidance as and when required. Many students avail of the reference book facility through faculty library cards. Some of the advanced learners are sent for different curricular activities.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

Academic information is gauged from the result sheets of previous examinations. Students who are irregular and lag behind in submission/projects etc are contacted by the respective subject teachers. Teachers take efforts to understand the reasons for the same or lack of interest.

Students coming from low income family or facing domestic problems are counseled by the teachers and if need be, are sent to the Guidance and Counseling Cell of the college. Financial aid and support is provided to economically poor students from the Student Aid Fund. The permission is given to students to pay their fees in installments.

Whenever the students approach the Principal or Vice Principal for cancellation of admission, they in turn, try to ascertain the reasons for the same. If they are seeking transfer to other Institutions for course of their choice then the admission is cancelled and if their reasons are not genuine then the teachers take efforts to counsel and convince the child with regard to completion of their education.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Our college's academic calendar is made on a yearly basis from which a teaching schedule of 180 days is chalked out. Every department plans its activities in accordance with the academic calendar. The Head of the Departments of different departments monitors syllabus completion through periodical departmental meetings. Initial lectures of every academic year aims at orienting the students with syllabus and Credit Based Grading System (CBGS). Our college has an Examination Committee that displays the examination schedule on the college and students notice-boards and college's websites and ensures the internal assessment and semester-end examinations. The committee also endeavors to see that the evaluation of answer books are completed by the teachers concerned in time and declares the results.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

At the onset of every academic year, the IQAC gives guidelines regarding the distribution of workload for each department. The IQAC also encourages the teachers to make an effective teaching plan so that the entire syllabus can be completed within time. It also propels the teachers to make use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) as and when possible. To make teaching-learning process interesting, the IQAC harps on the use of audio-visual aids and effective use of library which contains a number of journals, CDs, magazines, reference books etc. The IQAC also takes measures to see that the student community is well-oriented in the use of library facilities.

The IQAC also motivates the teachers to submit Minor/Major Research Projects to different funding agencies to get the funds and hence to improve the infrastructures. For fulfilling the same, the IQAC regularly guides the teachers and provide necessary information. The IQAC encourages the faculty members to attend orientation courses/ refresher courses/ summer training programmes and also the seminars/ conferences/workshops so as to hone their knowledge and skills and keep themselves abreast of the changing scenario in their respective fields.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among students?

It is our endeavor to make learning process interesting to cater to the needs of the tech-savvy generation and hence, a number of steps are taken like:

- > A separate setup with computer and internet facility has been maintained for the students.
- > Teachers allot group assignments and individual projects to students to enhance their team-spirit and coordination skills.
- > Interactive sessions in the form of Group Discussion and Debates are conducted.
- > Students are encouraged to participate in intra and inter cocurricular and extra-curricular activities.
- > The UG and PG students are encouraged to attend seminars/workshops/conferences.
- > Preliminary Examinations (both theory and practical) are conducted for final year students.

- > Apart from regular lectures, classroom teaching is also made interesting by conducting quiz and class tests.
- > Teachers make use of maps, charts, posters, models, diagrams to instill knowledge through sensory perception.
- > Teachers make use of LCD while teaching wherever necessary.
- > Industrial/Institutional/ Field visits are regularly organized by some departments.
- > Students are encouraged to make Power Point Presentations as part of internal assessment.
- > The college promotes the active involvement of students in organizing workshops, seminars, conferences, sports activities and cultural events.
- 2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Keeping in mind the goals of Higher Education, the college takes care to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students by organizing elocution and essay writing competitions, debate and poster-making competitions on current issues. A platform for creative outlet is given to students to pen down their thoughts in the form of poems, essays, stories etc in the college magazine.

Cultural Committee, through its Annual Cultural Programmes, EXPRESSIONS, draws out the latent talents of the students by giving them an opportunity to show-case their creativity. The Arts Circle, a branch of the Cultural Committee, organizes MEHANDI, NAIL ART, CALLIGRAPHY, PAINTING, POSTER-MAKING, RANGOLI, SALAD DRESSING, FLOWER ARRANGEMENT, BEST OUT OF WASTE COMPETITIONS to develop creative talent.

The Department of Mathematics organizes "FUN IN MATHS" through the introduction of Vedic Mathematics. The History Department stirs the critical thinking of the students by organizing visits to historical sites.

The Science Departments conduct science exhibitions to further the inquisitive abilities of students and drive them towards research. Students are also groomed and molded to participate in inter-collegiate competitions. The science association invites eminent scientists to deliver lectures, organizes poster competitions and video shows and encourages discussions on new ideas and technologies to motivate and propel them to take up research. Students are also groomed and molded to participate in intercollegiate competitions.

Seven-day residential camp is organized every year by the NSS Unit and a number of activities are planned and organized to develop social awareness and inculcate responsibility and accountability among students. Special Days like Human Rights Day, AIDs Day, Women's Day, Constitution Day etc are also celebrated.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning – resourses from National Programme on Technology Enhancing Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile, education, etc.

To keep in tune with the changing times, teachers are provided with modern technological facilities like internet, LCDs, e-magazines, on line journals, variety of newspapers, CDs, periodicals and large number of books. The college has BCL membership which can be availed of by the faculty. Teachers make use of ICT tools during lectures whenever necessary. The students are facilitated with space in the library to work on their Power Point Presentations, Projects and also to access information and study material from the Web. INFLIBNET's N-LIST and JSTOR are subscribed by the college.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blending learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Lectures by experts in various fields are arranged by the departments/associations/forums. Teachers are encouraged to attend seminar/conferences/workshops to help in keeping with the new developments in their areas of specialization. Members of different faculties are encouraged to undertake orientation /Refresher/ Short Term Courses/Summer Camps etc. for the purpose to enhance their expertise.

The students are being motivated to participate in various activities occurring in college premises and other neighbouring colleges.

2.3.7. Detail (process and the number of students/benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

Students are given academic counseling. Expert lectures were organized for TY BA, B.Com and B.Sc students.

Science teachers provide support and guidance to the students at every level of the course. They explain the subject in vernacular language for better dissemination of the concept, encourages the students to collect information relevant to the topics as well prepare posters for display and Power points for discussions.

Guidance for MPSC and UPSC exams are provided to students in the college with the view to help them prepare logically and systematically to be successful in the exams.

Students are given personal counseling by teachers of the Department of Psychology during college working hours. Students are encouraged to approach teachers in case of academic problems. College has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell which invites professionals from various fields to cater to students' demands.

The college also boasts of a Guidance and Counseling Centre that organizes programmes to help in the development of the students psyche and improve their personality. The college also has a Women's Development Cell which conducts programmes and talks, especially for female students to make them aware of pressing issues like female infanticide, sexual harassment, domestic violence and so on.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Teachers use softwares to make the content very easy for the students (TY B. Sc., M.Sc. Students use SPSS software for statistical calculation). Many teachers make study material and send it to students through e-mail.

Simulations are used to make the topic simplified and solve problems.

Mock interviews, one-minute speeches, oral presentations, group discussions are conducted by different departments. This gives

student confidence not only to voice their thoughts and opinions but also become logical in their thought process and help in their communication skills being enhanced. Some departments hold rapid-fire quiz and memory tests too.

Teachers allot assignments/projects to students thereby improving their analytical skills. This helps them to understand the concept better.

The History Department has its own blog (historyrkt.wordpress.com).

Field and industrial visits are organized on a regular basis by some departments. Students, through these visits, get reliable information about the world around them.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library is the soul of every educational institution. We have ample stock of books, journals, magazines, maps etc. Our library is digitalized, has internet facility for students and a separate room for teachers to read and guide students. Students can access newspapers on college website. INFLIB, JSTOR are accessed by teachers with individual login and password. Library organizes book exhibitions to create awareness among students and teaching faculty.

Library trains students and teachers for using library resources. F.Y. students are given special orientation so that they can use the library effectively.

Library also extends its facility in the form of book bank for needy students. Some departments also maintain their own library for easy accessibility.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned timeframe and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, completing the curriculum within the planned timeframe and calendar is difficult, especially after the introduction of CBGS. Whenever a faculty member goes for Refresher or Orientation Programme or is on Medical Leave or Duty Leave, then lectures

are engaged after they resume work or at times the work load is shared among the existing faculty. Some departments conduct extra lectures on Sundays and holidays to make up for the lost time.

2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning?

To monitor and evaluate quality of teaching-learning, departmental meetings are conducted with HODs/VPs/Principal. Feedback is obtained from students for each teacher and necessary actions taken. Suggestion boxes are placed in the lecture complex wherein students get an opportunity to express their experiences of the teaching-learning process. With the help of feedback, steps are taken accordingly to overcome any problems, if any.

New teachers are appointed whenever the vacancies are generated. The selection and recruitment of the teaching staff is done as per the UGC guidelines followed and implemented by the University of Mumbai. The teachers competency in term of the command of the on the subjects and communication skills is judged during the interview by the experts in the interview panel.

Faculty members are deputed to attend workshops organized by the university/other colleges to discuss the new topic introduced in the curriculum. They are also encouraged to attend refresher course to keep them updated in their subjects.

Faculty members are deputed to attend training programmes on new emerging areas whenever available to update their knowledge.

Guest speakers on emerging areas are also invited.

To teach topics related to the new and emerging/modern fields of study experts are invited as guest speakers. Faculty from nearby colleges is also invited as guest/visiting faculty for conducting lectures.

Whenever training programmes are available for such new/emerging areas, existing faculty members are deputed to attend them and update their knowledge and methods of teaching.

Internet facility is provided in the departments and also in the library for the teachers.

The faculties are encouraged to suggest names of reference books in new emerging areas or purchase them through online purchase system to be added into the library resources.

In the college library, separate space is maintained for the teachers.

> Teaching learning methods/approaches

The college motivates teachers for ICT enabled teaching. In subjects like accounts and maths, students are given additional problems for practice.

➤ Handling new curriculum

The faculty members are deputed to attend the workshops organized by the Universities/other colleges to discuss the revision the curriculum. The Department of Zoology in association with Board of Studies in Zoology, University of Mumbai, held a meeting of members and Chairman of Board of Studies (Zoology) with all zoology teachers of Thane region, to discuss content(s) of the new syllabus of CBSGS which was adopted by the University of Mumbai from academic year 2011-12.

The Department of Commerce organized one day workshop on Credit Based Semester Grading System to familiarize the teachers about the new system.

The Departments of Economics and Marathi also organized one day workshops on Credit Based Semester Grading System to familiarize the teachers about the new system.

➤ Content/knowledge management

Teachers are deputed to attend Orientation and Refresher courses. They are also encouraged to write articles, present research papers and undertake minor and major research projects. Management provides necessary support for motivating teachers to attend various training programmes to enhance their skills.

> Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

The college has a well equipped library, Students and faculty members are provided with free internet facilities. Project work are assigned to the students and notes prepared by the teachers on topics related to syllabus are given to students.

> Assessment

The college follows the assessment procedures introduced by the University of Mumbai since academic year 2011-12.

> Cross cutting issues

Students need not be taught in isolation when there are many avenues available for the teachers to correlate it with other subjects. This makes teaching-learning more enjoyable and concept attainment becomes easier.

➤ Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

Few class rooms are provided with interactive boards. Teachers are encouraged to used the facility for seminars and talks by experts.

- > Teaching learning material development, selection and use

Lecture method of teaching is supplemented by use of audiovisuals, group discussions and presentations, discussions on case studies, industrial visits, project work, field trips and visit to research centers Talks and seminars on subject related topics are organized for the benefit of the students.

Notes are prepared by teachers for certain subjects highlighting important points and are given to the students.

As an innovative method to develop the communication ability of vernacular medium students, our language teachers give more stress on presentations and oral communication.

The college being affiliated to University of Mumbai follows the CBGS of Evaluation introduced since 2011-12. So to acquaint the teachers:

- > Principal informs all teachers about the changes applicable during a staff meeting.
- ➤ One day Workshops was organized by Commerce department for college teachers to discuss the CBGS and its implementation (2011).
- > The examination committee disseminates information to teachers and the students about the changes if any notified by the University.
- > Copies of the University circulars are handed over to all H.O.Ds and displayed on the notice boards for the students.
- > The students are informed about the details of the new systems during lectures.
- The college website is updated so that the new evaluation process is made available to one and all i.e. teachers and students.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The College strictly follows the University's guidelines regarding the examination and evaluation systems. No separate evaluation reforms are initiated by the college. Since the year 2011-12 the CBGS for F. Y. students, 2012-13 for the S. Y. and PG part I, and 2013-14 for the T. Y. and PG part II has been adopted by the college, as implemented by University of Mumbai.

Examinations are conducted at the end of each semester. Each semester comprises 60% for semester end examination and 40% for internal assessment as per the BOS guidelines.

Teachers are abide by the university circulars and assure that the syllabi are completed before commencement of exams, question papers are framed accordingly.

Assessment process is centralized; preparation of results is computerized to ensure effective and timely implementation of reforms.

The University of Mumbai through CBGS has introduced Formative Evaluation of students. This covers 40 marks.

Formative evaluation has thus resulted into better and face to face contact between teachers and students. It has also improved the attendance and interest of the students as they are being continuously evaluated.

This entire evaluation process (60/40) is liked by students and teachers.

By monitoring their attendance we have inculcated a sense of discipline and value of time in them. Debates and discussion are a medium to bring out their latent talent, sharpen their oratory and analytical skills.

The affiliated university expects every graduate to be skilled human resource. Education is overall development of human personality. Short term courses are conducted by most of the Departments. Making our student skilled graduate, care is taken to sensitize them issues prevailing in society and stand up for marginalized.

Our campus is ragging free. For evaluation, university norms are strictly followed with complete transparency both at the college and university level.

Students with doubts regarding marks can apply for verification of marks and photo copy of answer book. If still not satisfied, students can apply again for Re-evaluation. Whereby the answer book is reassessed by another evaluator.

There also exists a Student's Council / Student's Grievance Cell. This can be approached by the students in case of further dissatisfaction so as to get proper justice.

- 2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

 - ➤ The main aim of the college is to provide holistic education. Thus, in addition to the regular academic programme, the college gives prominence to the development of personality, aesthetics and moral perspectives.
 - ➤ Mission Statement, Objectives of the College and Quality Policy stating the learning outcomes are displayed at prominent locations in the college campus; they are also printed in the prospectus given to the students and in the Academic Calendar provided to the teaching staff. The same are also displayed on the home page of the College website.
 - > Teachers make students aware of the learning outcomes in the class during the first lecture and during the practicals.

Students are assessed in the process of continuous evaluation under semester system. The continuous evaluation process includes class tests, assignments, projects, tutorials, presentations, viva-voce etc. The results of the students are communicated to them by displaying on the notice board and a hard copy of mark-sheet is issued to them. Results of unaided courses are loaded on the web. This system has improved the passing percentage visibly in all the faculties.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The following strategies are adopted to facilitate the achievement of the learning outcomes:

- > College ensures that teaching takes place for 90 days in each semester.
- > Students" attendance is continuously monitored.
- ➤ Academic calendar and Teaching plans are prepared according to University guidelines. Teachers are given full freedom to adopt suitable teaching methods as per their choice. Review is taken by the Head of the Department regarding suitability of the method adopted. Strategy for internal assessment of F. Y. and S. Y. classes is developed by the college within the framework given by university.

 - ➤ The College offers many courses like B. Com, B/I, A/F, BMS, IT, M.Sc., M.Com. which are helpful in getting good placements in the new liberalized economy.

- Eminent personalities from various fields are invited to deliver lectures and exposure to the students regarding existing opportunities.
- > The college has an active Placement cell to ensure availability of quality jobs. It organizes workshops on Group discussions and Personal interviews. Mock interviews are also conducted.

Innovations and Research Aptitude

- > To promote innovation, various activities such as debates, GDs, seminars/conferences and competitions such as poster competition, PPT competition, documentary making etc. are organized. Further, students are encouraged to participate in various innovative intercollegiate competitions.
- > Students are assigned project work, encouraged to attend seminars, conferences etc. Every year many departments of the college organize seminars, conferences, workshops etc. This helps in developing research aptitude among the students.
- ➤ A large number of the teaching faculty is involved in research activities which enable the imparting of the recent advances and development of research aptitude amongst the students.
- 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?
 - > The information about the academic performance and learning outcomes is collected from the result sheet of previous examination / test. Additionally through personal one-to-one discussions, the faculty deduces the problem faced by the student.

Accordingly the support is provided as discussed below:

- > Departments analyze the results of their respective subjects.
- > On the basis of analysis slow learners are identified so that special attention can be given to them.
- > Remedial coaching is provided to these students.
- > Special care is taken for vernacular medium students
- > Some students are poor performers due to family problems. Whenever any teacher identifies such a student (by his/her behavior), he/she gives him/her emotional support. For such students counseling is given by experts invited. This is a regular activity of the career and counseling cell.
- > Some of the students are from economically poor backgrounds. Such students are identified from their admission forms. They are provided freeships under EBC scheme. Some teachers provide

financial support personally to such students or make provisions from the Student Aid Fund.

- Question banks are provided to the students and they are made to write answers.
- > To give practice to students, questions asked in the University examinations are provided to final year students. They are asked to answer them, they are assessed and the best way of answering them is discussed with them.
- 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes

Achievement of learning outcomes of the students is monitored through their results and their placements after completion of graduation/post-graduation. The information about the placement is collected through alumni meet and social networking sites.

Whatever is provided to the students through curricular, cocurricular and extra-curricular activities is evaluated in different ways. Knowledge gained through curricular activities is evaluated by formal examinations whereas evaluation for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities is through participation of student in various activities / competitions, awards / prizes received etc.

The exam results are analyzed by individual teachers and at departmental level; students above and below the average are enlisted. Intensive coaching is offered to above average students and remedial coaching to weaker students.

Some departments of the college have started remedial coaching from the year June 2012-13. Many departments (Economics, Political Science, Psychology, Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Microbiology and Zoology) came forward keeping in mind the number of failures in their respective subjects.

The committee also takes the initiatives to develop research interest among the UG and PG students and supports them to participate in seminars/workshops as an attempt to inculcate the idea of research in them.

The Principal investigator is given full autonomy with respect to utilization of funds and flexibility in lectures as per the UGC/University rules.

All the resources within the institution are made easily available to the faculty members as and when required for pursuing research and funded projects.

- > Other facilities like library, computer laboratory, internet and departmental library are made available on priority basis as and when required.
- > Library has special section for research students and staff involved in the research.
- ➤ The college has membership of British Council Library. Also subscribed for the INFLIB NET programme, which gives easy access to various research journal. Help is also made available in terms of necessary software.
- > Subscription to SHODH GANGA that gives access to theses in various subjects
- > The library has WEB-OPAC with multilingual search options.
- > The college has subscribed journals and magazines which help in research activity of the faculty members and students.
- ❖ Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers.

The adjustment of duties among the colleagues is allowed. Though there is no reduced teaching load or any special leave granted.

- Support in terms of technology and information needs
- ➤ The college provides computer facility with internet to staff and students. The computer laboratories are easily accessible to staff and students from 7.00 am to 6.00pm. Internet facility is provided to staff and students in the library and also in various departments.
- > The equipments in the departments especially in science departments are available for all staff members and students for their practical and research work with prior permission from the respective head of the department.

The Principal and account department completes all formalities related to project funds so that the same can be timely submitted to the funding agencies.

- > Tissue culture Lab.
- **Botany research laboratory for Ph. D students.**
- > A Separate study room for staff in the library.

For effective academic growth & to inculcate research interest in students and staff, the college has developed:

Few class rooms are made digital with white boards and LCD monitors.

The campus of college is spread across an area of 4 acres (2 acre main building + 2 acre extension). It has a main building with administrative wing (4773.08 m²), library building (1248.75 m²),

Gymkhana (117.81 m²) and a stage in the premises. The college also has a separate building as extension for the self financing courses.

The main objective of our institute is to educate the students and bring improvement in teaching and learning activities. To support this objective access to current and comprehensive information is very much important and essential. The library takes care of collection development and weeding out of books as to maintain active, up to-date, current and a balanced collection through following activities

Requisitions from faculty, Non-teaching staff and students. The central library circulates Catalogues, book list and book reviews regularly to the faculty members and other staff. Efforts are taken to hold annual Book exhibition. Recommended books are then purchased with Head of the department and Principal's consent.

- Course syllabus Books listed in the course syllabus as and when recommended by the staff are purchased in the library.
- Books on approval Books are received on approval basis regularly from different vendors, and selection is done by faculty after browsing them.
- Visit to Book Exhibitions Teachers and librarian visit book exhibitions conducted by other organizations for selection of books.
- E-Shopping with online catalogues online catalogue of publishes and e-shopping sites are regularly browsed to get information on latest editions of Books. The Books are purchased through flipkart. com, book ganga .com.
- Book Exhibition The central library conducts yearly book exhibition where in different publishers and distributors are invited to display the recently published books. Books are recommended very actively by faculty and students. This helps in developing the collection.
- Requisitions The central library regularly receives requisition for books, Journals Magazines and other reading or study material from staff and students and processes them at the earliest.
- New Arrivals display Procured current titles by the library are periodically display in the new arrivals corner to advertise them
- E-mail &SMS faculty members are informed through e-mail & sms for books arrived in the library.
- Department wise book lists The departments are provided with complete financial year as per their requisition.

All these measures enable the users to know the current titles added in the library and also enhance their use.

 - > Teaching and learning has become more equipped and technically sound with the use of modern technology. Teachers use power point presentations, screen films and provide list of the website for further reference.
 - > The library is computerized with 'SOUL software'. Internet and computer facilities are made easily accessible to the students. The library acquires the most updated and latest books, magazines and periodicals, reference books, journals and periodicals.

- ➤ Whenever the vacancies arise, an application is made to Joint Director, Higher Education to obtain No Objection Certificate (NOC) for appointment.
- > The posts are advertised after the receipt of NOC.
- ➤ In case of teaching staff the selection committee includes outside subject experts apart from the HOD, Principal and Management.
- > In case of non-teaching staff, the selection committee consists of the Registrar, management representative and Principal.
- > The knowledge and skill of the candidates are tested objectively and a suitable candidate is selected.

- ➤ In case of teaching staff the approval of university and the Joint Director is obtained and in case of non-teaching staff the approval of Joint Director is obtained.
- ➤ In case of delay in getting NOC the management appoints the suitable candidates on temporary basis.
- Industry interaction
 - ➤ Industrial visits are organized annually by various Departments. However, as of now there are no tie ups with any industry.
- 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?
 - Emails and reports are sent to the management periodically. In addition regular meetings are held with the management.

 - Staff members are appointed as members of various committees and are actively involved in college administration. Teachers are assigned committees as per their aptitude and interest.
- 6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.
 - In the LMC meeting held on 26-10-12 it was resolved that the following infrastructural improvements will be made in the college
 - 1) To create additional space by constructing more floors on the library
 - 2) To create an audio visual room in Room no 3 ground floor
 - 3) To convert the room near the principal office into a fully fledged conference room and shift the office work done in that room to other room in first floor
 - 4) To improve the waste water drainage system which led to clogging of water near chemistry department
 - 5) To install a water harvesting system

6) Installation of solar panels in terrace to meet at least a part of power needs of the college

Status of resolution

Proposal has been submitted to Ulhasnagar Municipal corporation in this connection. The Architect associated with the College Board has prepared the necessary building plans. The college has also applied for an FSI of 4 to the Government which is granted to health and educational institutions.

Provision of audio visual room and conference room have been implemented

The waste water drainage system has been rebuilt and the college received the funds from the corpus of local MLA in this connection.

Water harvesting system has been installed covering the terrace of main building of the college. It will be extended to other building also

The management has taken quotations in this regard but the implementation is due as the structural factors of our aged buildings are to be ascertained before mounting the solar panels on the terrace.

Resolutions passed in the collegiate board meeting held on Sept 12, 2013

It was resolved to increase the allowance paid to vice principals from Rs 1000 to Rs 5000.

It was resolved after accepting the VRS application given by Asso Prof Sonde of Micro biology department.

It was also resolved that Dr Gorge, Head of History Department on lien as Principal in another college should be called back in view of expiry of lien period or his resignation be accepted.

It was resolved that one vice principal be appointed from commerce faculty as all the existing vice principals belonged to Arts and Science faculty.

Status of resolution

The allowance to vice principals have been raised.

VRS applications of Prof Sonde accepted and all her retirement benefits granted.

Dr Gorge chose to resign from the college, the resignation was accepted in view of his appointment in another college as Principal,

The appointment of vice principal from commerce faculty is pending however Mr Thadhani involved in teaching commerce students has been appointed as Sr vice principal.

Yes. But the college has not yet applied for the same.

The Grievance cell is functional in the college. The campus is free from ragging. Though students approach the cell with grievances pertaining to exam results, admission, Non functional fans, tube lights, non availability of sufficient drinking water points etc. As of now we have been able to resolve all issues with alacrity.

There have been no instances of any court cases being filed against the institutes by non-teaching or teaching staff during the last four years.

- > To take effort for organizing seminars and workshops.
- > To organize workshop whenever there is change in academic curriculum.
- > Provide well equipped library with broad band facilities. It also subscribes to latest and reputed journals and periodical so as to keep pace with the latest development in various subject areas.
- ➤ Provide Computer Lab, Projectors as well as LCD's for the professional development of its faculty.
- > Provides well equipped Auditorium to conduct workshops and seminars.
- > Encourages the members of the faculties to play proactive role in the syllabus revision.

For Non Teaching Faculty:

- 1) Encouraged to pursue higher education and obtain qualification like graduation and post graduation.
- 2) Non teaching staff who are qualified for teaching are given chance to take lectures in aided as well as unaided section of degree college on CHB/Part time / Full Time Basis.
- 3) Encourage to participate in workshops conducted with reference to change in rules and procedures. The senior staff members are encouraged to improve their soft skills by providing the facilities or they are relived from their duties for few hours to learn from external sources.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1. Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, green audit of the campus is conducted.

Energy Audit

College management has taken an initiative effort to conduct an Energy audit to find out the energy consumption for which a survey is conducted in the entire campus with the objective of minimizing energy consumption.

The survey included identifying the energy consumption in various locations of the college, assessing the usage of electricity and energy loss due to faults and proposed possible reduction in energy usage.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation

The students are instructed to switch off the electric appliances and instruments after use. All the lights, fans and air conditioners are put off when not required.

Some of the classrooms are so airy and well ventilated that they hardly need any artificial lighting which helps a lot in conservation of electricity.

Energy efficient electrical appliances with 4-5 stars have been purchased in recent years

Water harvesting

One of the important measures adopted in the college is rain water harvesting system.

The main objective of this system is to store and to recycle the rain water, to avoid water flowing to the drainage system &to reduce burden on water supply and finally, this water can be used for garden and other purpose.

These efforts have helped us tremendously to overcome the water shortage during summer.

Check dam construction

Every year NSS 7 days residential camp is organized at adopted village and the students construct check dam at the village river for storage of water.

Efforts for Carbon neutrality

The college campus tries to be plastic polythene free zone, which makes the campus eco-friendly. The dead leaves and waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire. The leaves are buried in the soil itself and the papers are disposed off.

Managing Solid waste is achieved by the following ways.

Permanent boards focusing Eco-concerns, 3R"s (Reduce, Reuse and Recycle) are displayed to create awareness among students.

The wastes are segregated by twin-bin system.

The food waste from the canteen is dumped into wet bins & then into compost bin for composting.

Leaf litter from the campus is used for bio composting followed by vermi-composting and the compost is used in the college garden.

Waste paper Recycling

Segregation of plastic wastes is being done with an aim of recycling. Use of disposable plastic cups/glasses in the canteen and departments is strongly discouraged and use of steel/ glass /paper plates and cups is encouraged.

Lectures and poster competitions are organized to create awareness regarding major causes of air pollution, importance of reducing vehicle emissions, etc. amongst the students and faculty.

Plantation

The campus has a good number of trees. Since our campus has space limitations we motivate students to plant saplings during the monsoon in & around the college. Every year some plants/ saplings are planted in the campus. Department of Botany maintains a garden of medicinal plants. Every year more than 100 medicinal plants are exhibited in Thane "Vrukshvalli" plant exhibition, organized by Thane Municipal Corporation.

The trees are numbered and the botanical name and common name of the tree is displayed on it.

The "Environment Day" is celebrated in the third week of June.

after the college reopens. Lectures & PPT are presented to motivate the students & make them aware of global environmental issue.

Environmental Awareness Programme is also conducted through the NSS and NCC Units.

NSS UNIT

Through NSS unit students are encouraged and motivated to plant saplings at the selected places outside college campus. The NSS volunteers have consistently contributed to plantation by planting saplings at all NSS camp sites over the decades.

N.S.S. students-

- > Planted 150 trees at Karaole village, Ambernath district.
- > Conducted activity of cleaning village of Karoale, Ambernath district.
- ➤ Took active part for Polio –Vaccination.
- > Road safety awareness Rally was conducted at Karaole village, Ambernath district.
- > Disrict level Ellocution on "SAVE ENVIRONMENT" was arranged at district level.
- > Participated in Parade on Yuva Divas" at university.
- > Tree plantation was conducted at Dombivali.
- > Donated Books & dresses to ST students from rural areas.

NCC UNIT

- **Blood donation camps are arranged every year.**
- > Camps are arranged related to Gender issues.
- > NCC students take active part in polio vaccination programmes.
- Orphange home visit is arranged.
- > Camps are arranged to bring awareness for Hygeine & Sanitation, Adult Education, Leprosy awareness.
- > Rallies are arranged for Anti-tobbacco, anti-dowry, Earth Day.
- ➤ Civil defence programmes are arranged in the college to create awareness among all students.

Hazardous waste management

E-waste management

Computers are shared among various department. Annual maintenance contract is signed for regular maintenance and repair of computers and equipments. We make use of functional spare parts of obsolete equipments.

Computers and peripherals are sorted and exchanged with new purchases. UPS batteries are recycled.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The college has introduced several innovations to create a positive impact on the functioning of academics, administration and other levels of the college working.

A student friendly innovative method is used for collecting the Assignments of B.Com and B.A students which are very large in number. These students submit all subjects Assignment on a single day in a systematic manner. This system avoids confusion among the students and ensures complete submission at the same type without chaos.

No queue system for collecting Hall-Tickets, Mark sheets.

No queue system for taking admission and paying fees allotting different rooms for different streams for the above purpose, thereby introducing "one window system" concept

Sharing of study material through Internet.

All the departments have Internet connections.

Feedback mechanism

Students' feedback about teachers and the teaching learning process is obtained from the students at the end of every academic year. Suggestions boxes are placed at strategic places for getting students feedback.

Zero-Balance Accounts:-Punjab National Bank, Union Bank, and Federal Bank visit our college for students and to avail Zero-Balance facility for admission and scholarship purpose.

Academic Innovations

The college has introduced many innovative practices for the students to motivate them and to develop interest in the subject of choice.

Various departments plan out programmes to suit their students.

The department of History conducts workshop and lectures on "Brahmi Scripts" ancient culture and Numismatic.

Department of Economics conducted seminars on Budget analysis.

Department of Political Science conducted mock Parliament, visit to Tehsil and police station to study working strategies.

Department of Psychology organized workshop on stress management with special reference to exam stress.

All language departments conducts workshops on grammar, translation, dramatic etc.

Science Department organized visits to industries, Research labs, lectures by eminent personalities, excursions and field visits are organized as per the curriculum. Regular Nature Trail is arranged for all science students.

Science exhibitions were organized to motivate all students.

Science students expressed scientific concepts in simple rangoli form to bring awareness among the mass, exhibition on "common diseases were presented as poster and video by the students.

Students are encouraged to participate in inter collegiate event and in scientific conventions like seminars and conferences. Few students presented a poster in a National conference.

Best Practices in the Library

The central library has automated its entire collection, functions and services in a networked environment with SOUL 2.0 software. The OPAC has facilitated the users with quick and easy access to information related to availability and status of a document.

Federated searching tools to search articles in multiple databases-Knimbus search facility is available in N-List databases.

Library Website – Library information is incorporated in institute website itself.

In-house/remote access to e-publications staff and students can access INFLIBNET, N-List databases in house as well as remotely through user ID's and password login.

LIBRARY AUTOMATION:

The entire central library functioning is automated with SOUL a standard integrated client server based library management software from INFLIBNET (An Autonomous Inter – University Centre of UGC). All the sections of the library i.e. acquisition, circulation, cataloging, Periodical have been computerized. The circulation of books & CD's is automated with bar –coding technology. The processing of books with computerized spine and barcode labels is taken up through the software.

The non book material like CD's, Journal magazine bound volumes are also catalogued in the database.

7.3 Best Practices

We follow many best practices though we are presenting only two:

A) TITLE: To generate awareness in the society about arsenic contamination.

GOAL

- 1. To initiate Research culture among the students.
- 2. To sensitize the students about social issues.
- 3. To involve the students especially from the science streams in such social activities and make them realize feeling of goodness in helping the society.
- 4. To bring awareness among the people especially the villagers about the consequences of arsenic toxicity.
- 5. To spread the knowledge of arsenic and its hazardous effect on mankind.
- 6. To determine the arsenic contaminant in drinking water in area/villages of Ulhasnagar.

CONTEXT

Arsenic is well known toxicant in the nature. The prevalence of arsenic in water supply and its ill effects in the early days was limited to some areas of lower Ganga basins in the district of West Bengal which was known to be the "gold mines" of Arsenic. Today, it is not limited to these regions and is reported to be available in the upper Ganga Basins also. The Arsenic is found deep in the earth crust, available as insoluble form. Whenever it comes in contact with the air, arsenic oxides are formed which is water soluble.

Modern technologies for optimal use of ground water like the submersible pumps, hand pumps, bore wells act as catalysts in provoking this hazardous substance into the drinking water supply. The supply of arsenic to drinking water not only affects the human population, but now is also available in surface water such as ponds, lakes etc. This arsenic is in pentavalent form and is thermodynamically more stable than its other forms. Arsenic in this form easily penetrates the surface tissues such as skin and the alimentary canal of the human. It has more affinity with surface tissues and becomes accumulated leading to cancer.

In drinking water supply, the environmental protection agency (EPA), USA has determined the maximum concentration limit 10 ppb. Keeping this in mind and the prevalence of arsenic in drinking water, the college took the initiatives towards this project. Arsenic levels in water supplies in the nearby rural areas was detected with help field kit, the data was analyzed and discussed with the people to bring awareness among them.

PRACTICE

- 1. Students were addressed to the issue regarding arsenic poisoning.
- 2. Students were selected based on their interest to pursue research.
- 3. Group of six students were selected from science departments Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Physics and Chemistry though flexibility was maintained with respect to number of students from each departments.
- 4. Selected students were explained about the project and given training in procedure of sampling, collection of data and evaluating and maintaining of data records.
- 5. Students in three groups of 10 each along with teacher and nonteaching staff surveyed the nearby area to select the site.
- 6. Sampling of water was done followed by quality testing and collection of samples for quantitative detection of arsenic in laboratory.
- 7. The data generated were statistically analyzed and conclusion drawn.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

The data obtained clearly indicated -

- 1. High level of arsenic in the sample.
- 2. High risk to the population.
- 3. Higher chances of incidence of arsenic related toxicity.
- 4. Possibility of bioaccumulation and biomagnifications.

The students working in the project were benefited in terms of following

- 1. Realized the importance of water quality in day to day life.
- 2. Consequences of "CHALTA HAI" (careless) attitude.
- 3. How to go about research problem.
- 4. Reasoning to be drawn from results (data).
- 5. Outcomes of painstaking endeavor.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

STUDENTS

1. Most of the students though showed interest in pursuing research, were easily deterred by the challenges faced during the sampling.

- 2. The students were shy to go about and ask for sample procurement.
- 3. They encountered resistance from some villagers.
- 4. The idea though interesting encountered financial crunches.
- 5. Since sampling and analysis were done on Sunday, many students showed inhibition.

- B) TITLE: To inculcate the sense of responsibility and sensitize the students to issues of elderly parents in old age homes.

GOAL

- 1. To sensitize the students towards the abandoned elderly parents.
- 2. To create awareness among students about the challenges face by elderly people in shelter homes ie; Physical and health issues, Mental instability and feeling of insecurity, social isolation and dealing with the feeling of hopelessness.
- 3. To orient and prepare the students to take lesson from these exposures so that they may handle better relationship with their own ageing parents.

CONTEXT

Today is the world of nuclear families consisting of parents and maximum of two children. Parents who are responsible for today's generation are nowhere in the scheme envisaged by the concept of small families. The responsibility and accountability towards ageing parents have been shifting form children to professional bodies like old age homes etc. through these efforts we hope to instill some self corrective measures at our end. So that is may foster good and healthy relationship between generations.

PRACTICE

The management, teaching staff, non teaching staff and students are all involved in this exercise towards betterment of society. A well-drawn out procedure has been initiated for the same.

- 1. Initiation towards the programme by holding awareness lectures.
- 2. Undertaking visits and being a good listener to these senior citizens who love to interact a lot.
- 3. Providing certain basic medical facilities like cleaning wounds, bandaging, massaging etc;
- 4. Providing them basic facilities like feeding them, taking them to the loo, helping them walk etc;
- 5. Arranging social and cultural programmes in order to bring a smile on their faces.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

It is like end that justify the means. Many times we have found that they are waiting to welcome us with open arms and parting away from them always showing sadness on their wrinkled face. Many times they also remind us of calling at the centre and inquiring about their welfare.

Our students through this small exercise have gained the following.

- 1. Respect & devotion to the elderly
- 2. Imbibing altruistic behavior in students
- 3. To be regular & punctual at their workplace
- 4. It has encouraged initiative & drive among students
- 5. It has made them more responsible & accountable
- 6. Taught them how to delegate authority & instilled team spirit
- 7. Built empathy in their hearts
- 8. They have developed into adults with self confidence & zeal
- 9. They have come to believe that every problem conceives a hidden solution if we go on pegging at it.
- 10. Learnt never to give up and to evolve into good citizens.

Small endeavors on our part have removed minor ailments from their lives like depression, aches and pains and have restored self confidence in many of them. Many times we even reminded them of their children by our work of humanities.

PROBLEM ENCOUNTERED

Yet inspite of our whole hearted efforts, we did have problems and challenges and we still do have, some of them still niggling as

- 1. Voluntary enrollment was less in first year
- 2. Initially we were viewed with suspicion
- 3. Host organization was not ready to open up initially.
- 4. Activities were not co-ordinated in the initial stages.

 However, all the above problems have been resolved to a great extent but new problems have cropped up in form of
- 1. Minor ego clashes amongst people who provided service.
- 2. Expectation of recepient have increased
- 3. Host organization expect us to do many of their work
- 4. Travelling time to and fro has increased of late.

A feeling has developed that we can cater to senior citizens in and around our institution. A survey is been undertaken to see if we can get the target audience in and around the institution who need these services more and who are scattered.

RESOURCES REQUIRED

At the shelter home the infrastructure was in place and so only time was the sacrifice that we made. May be some amount on conveyance which at many times was done through staff personal vehicles. However, now the target audience has changed we may even require mobilizing resources because we will be providing services to scattered audience.

Strengths: Department boasts of well trained and well qualified psychologist who provide counseling to students to cope better with stress related issues. The department also caters to need of vernaculars medium students along with the English medium. The vernacular medium students are given special attention through remedial coaching. Our department updates itself in specialised areas by attending conferences and seminars.

Weakness: Though we have large no of students opting for psychology at the first years and second year level, our department does not have the final year psychology course. The department faces the problem of non availability of course material for the vernacular medium students as majority text available are foreign prints.

Opportunity: with growing demand for subject of psychology in today's world the department has an opportunity to start the TYBA course in the subject thereby, helping to retain the students in the college to pursue the subject their choice.

Challenges: Our college being located in the mofussil area, the department faces the challenge of attracting students for the Art's faculty especially psychology as the market demand is for commerce. Another challenge that we face is provision of resource material for vernacular medium students in the form of translating resources from foreign authors. In the current scenario starting the TYBA course in psychology is really a challenging task.


POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The Seva Sadan's R. K. Talreja College of Arts, Science & Commerce was accredited with "B⁺" Grade by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore in the year 2004. Throughout the assessment process the NAAC peer team member suggested many things to do for quality enhancement and sustenance of the college. Keeping in view, the college along with the IQAC which always remained in centre during formation and implementation of quality policy took several initiatives towards quality upgradation of college.

Following NAAC peer team suggestions, the college extended its campus as annexe campus located near the Central Hospital, Ulhasnagar and opened at least seven need based courses namely BMM, BMS, B. Com. (Banking & Insurance), B. Com. (Accounting & Finance), B. Com (Marketing & Finance), B. Sc IT and B. Sc. Com. Sci.. All these courses run under self finance scheme but recognized by the University of Mumbai, Mumbai. The guidelines regarding admission of students, fee structures and recruitment of faculty members for these courses are strictly followed. All these courses are today accommodating good number of students. The two departments namely Hindi Department and Botany Department are recognised as centre for PhD degree from University of Mumbai, Mumbai. Presently eight students in Hindi subject and three students in Botany subject are pursuing research leading to PhD degree from University of Mumbai.


The Department of Hindi is the centre for "SARAL HINDI" programme for Hindi students. The programme is fully sponsored by "HINDUSTANI PRACHAR SABHA". Under this programme, many activities including imparting of computer education to Hindi students (both UG and PG) are organised in every academic year. The purpose of giving computer education to Hindi students is to make them aware about computer technology and use of different software (s) like MS word, Power point, Excel, internet explorer etc in education. These students are provided computers from computer department for the practice.

The college encouraged both teaching and non-teaching staff members in service to achieve higher degrees in the subject. To achieve the same, college provided all facilities at both academic and administrative level. Mr. Sunit Paryani, Registrar of the College has qualified State Eligibility Test (SET), Pune Magarashtra in this year. The overall efforts taken by the college resulted in an increase in number of teachers enrolling for getting M. Phil and Ph. D. Degrees in last five years. The same can be easily illustrated by the following diagram.



The figure shows significant increase in number of teachers for enrolling and getting higher degrees such as M.Phil and PhD.

The college encouraged the faculty members to do the research, compile the data, write the manuscript and present and publish through participation in various State / national / international level symposia / seminars / conferences/workshops and also in journals of national and international repute. The overall initiatives taken by the college undoubtedly helped the faculty members in this direction.



The figure shows significant increase in number of participating teachers in various events (PTVE) and handling research projects (completed/ongoing/submitted) for in last five years.

The college however does not play any role in curriculum development as the curriculum is solely developed and implemented by the University of Mumbai

to its various affiliated colleges, took several steps to ensure effective implementation of the curriculum. These are:

- By arranging workshops and meetings in collaboration with board of studies.
- By inviting subject experts and guest speakers.
- By distributing hard copy of syllabus to the students.
- By arranging orientation programme to newly admitted students.
- By encouraging faculty members to take part in workshops/ meetings/ conferences which are related to curriculum.
- By encouraging faculty members to be actively involved in exam related work both at College and University level.
- By ensuring the first lecture to be based on curriculum.

The college under UGC scheme has given the facility of computer and internet to each and every department for easy accessibility of resources available online. This helped the students and faculty members for timely preparation and submission of assignment, reports, presentation of seminar, project etc. For the same, a separate arrangement for the students has been also made in the college's library. The college library also provides printing and scanning facility to the students. A separate study room with computer and internet facility in general has been set up in the college's library for faculty members.
